


# Outdoor Play and Learning (OPAL) Primary Programme



# The 12 Online Safety Tips of Christm FOR CHILDREN WITH NEW DEVICES

Christmas is almost upon us once again, and soon some lucky children will be excitedly tearing the wrapping off a new mobile phone, tablet or games console. For some of them, it will be the first time they've owned a device that connects them to the online world. Even for older children, a new device means new corners of the digital landscape to explore – and, unfortunately, new risks to be aware of.

We've put together our top tips so that you can guide your young ones in enjoying their new digital gifts safely and responsibly throughout the year to come. Merry Christmas!

### ALWAYS SET

If your child's new device has a password protection feature, use it! If I help to keep their private information safe and will deny others access to their device without permission. Your children's parswords should be something memorable to them — but something which other people can't guess (it's also a good idea for parents to write it down in case it gets forgottent).

# 4. KEEP NUMBERS

Make sure your child understands that they should never share their phone number with someone they don't know or accept a friend request from them. They should also appreciate that it's a good idea to mainly keep their device out of sight, never lend it to a stronger, and never put it down somewhere that other people could steallt or take it to use without asking.

### 7. EXPLAIN SECURE

Your home WFI is protected by a password that only your family knows, whereas public networks (like those found in coffee shops, for axample) can be accessed by anyone. It's important that your child groups this difference because, it they're using a portable device on an unsecured network, then a hacker could access their personal information without them even knowing.

### 10. SETTINGS OFF

It's safest to disable the device's location services (if it's a pertable device) so your child desarit inadvertently make other people awars of where they are. You can usually do this via the device's privacy control settings. Turning location settings off not only means your child's whereabouts cont be tracked by others, it also significantly estends battery iffs.

#### 2. SET UP PARENTAL CONTROLS

This really is an essential when your child gets a new device, so they're protected from the outset. Most phones, tablets and consoles a flow you to customise their settings to determine which games your child can play, how they can communicate (and who with), what content they can access and so on. It will give you peace of mind that they can't indivertently do something they shouldn't.

#### 5. HAVE 'THE MONEY CONVERSATION'

Before your children start using their new device in earnest, talk to them about imapp purchases and other ways that money might be spent through their device. Once they understand, you might want to agree on a spending limit and reassure them that they can come to you'll they're uncertain, or if they have made a purchase by accident.

### 8. SCREEN TIME

Using a device for too long, especially just before bed, can interfere with a child's steep quality and reduce their concentration and overall enthusicsm. It might be helpful to agree on certain times of day when they don't use their device. Most devices' settings let you specify a screen-time limit, helping your child to stay heeh and locused in order to perform well at school.

#### STAY AWARE OF THE SURROUNDINGS

It's quite common to see adults not looking where they re going while engrossed in their phone. Children are even more easily distracted, in some cases, children have been hit by cars or cyclists because they were storing at their device and lost track of where they were. Remind your child that screens and waking don't mix. If they need to use their device, they should stop in a safe place first.



#### 3. PAY ATTENTION TO AGE RATINGS

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One of the first things children want to do with any new device is play games and explore apps. Before they download anything or install a new console game, check its age roting. Many popular games and apps have content that's not suitable for younger ages. The safest long-term solution is to adjust the device's settings so they can only download and use games and apps appropriate for their age.

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#### 6. DISCOURAGE DEVICE DEPENDENCY

Of course, children who've just got a new device will naturally want to spend as much time on it as possible. But whether they're stapping bod guys, watching videos or connecting with hiends. It's easy for them to get attached very quickly. Getly remind them that having family time, going outdoors and getting some exercise are still fun, too. And the device will be there when they get back.

#### 9. ONLY PAIR WITH KNOWN BLUETOOTH DEVICES

Your child may want to connect to another device via Bluetooth, so they can listen to music wirelessly or shore pictures and videos with nearby friends. But if they use Bluetooth to link with a device that they don't know, they're at risk of a stranger being able to see their personal information or having someone transmit a virus onto their device.

### 12. NEED TO TALK

Even when you've made a device as secure as you can, there's still a possibility of your child seeing something that bothers them, or someone they don't inow attempting to contact them. If this happens, listen to their concerns, empathise and reassure them. Once they ve explained what happened, you can decide if you should take further action like blocking or reporting another user.

### Keeping Safe over Christmas

The safety of our school family and local community are of paramount importance to us. This week all children have all re-watched the NSPCC "Speak out. Stay safe." assembly, hosted by Ant and Dec online.

We would also advise parents to visit <u>www.thinkuknow.co.uk</u>. This is the website for a UK organisation which protects children both online and offline and contains a huge amount of information for parents / carers around online safety and different games / apps which may be particularly useful at this time of year.

Our 'Early Help' offer continues to be available to all families. If you are unsure whether school will be able to help, please just ask – if we can't, we will try and find you someone who can. 'Early Help' doesn't mean we are going to make a referral to social services (in fact this is rare!), so please do not be afraid to reach out for help when we return to school in the new year if this is something you require.

# RECEPTION SEPTEMBER 2023 SCHOOL APPLICATIONS

Applications opened on 1 October 2022 for primary school applications for entry in September 2023. **The closing date is 15 January 2023 at 11:59pm**.

You must apply on time. If you apply late, you are less likely to get offered a place at any of your preferred schools. Applications received after 15 January 2023 will be classed as late applications and will not be processed until after the offer of places on 17 April 2023.

Remember to list three different primary schools.

Important: Make sure you include details of any siblings attending your preferred school(s) in the field (box) provided for sibling details. Sibling details included in the incorrect field (box), such as in reasons for preference, will not be counted and may prevent you from gaining a place at your preferred school. Please note if you fill in the online application incorrectly, you are responsible for not completing the form correctly, not School Admissions and Fair Access Service.
